We invite undergraduate students to participate in a poster/project session and competition during the annual conference of the Consortium for Computing Sciences in Colleges — Northwestern Region held October 14 and 15, 2005 at University of Washington, Bothell.

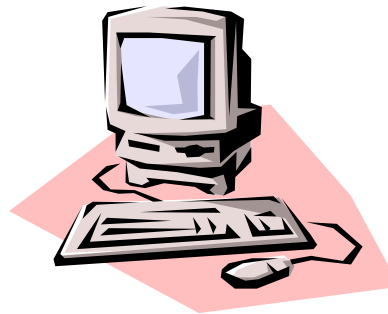
Undergraduates, including those who completed their Bachelor's degrees in spring 2005, are requested to submit an abstract describing their research or significant project.

Topics may include any computer-related research or significant project activity, either theoretical or applied. A faculty advisor must sponsor each proposal.

During the conference, an area will be reserved for the display of student posters and related materials describing their research or projects. Students will need to set-up their poster display by 8:00 a.m. Saturday Morning.

The poster session will be held the morning of Saturday, October 15. During this session, students will need to be present to discuss their work with conference attendees.

A panel of judges will select three winning posters/projects for awards. The winners will be recognized and receive their awards at the luncheon on Saturday.



The annual CCSC-NW conference is held in cooperation with ACM's SIGCSE. UPE, the International Honor Society for Computer Science, is sponsoring the awards for the best student posters.
